Linguistics and Language Behavior Abstracts

What is LLBA?: LLBA provides bibliographic citations and abstracts for articles from over 1,500 language and linguistic periodicals, in several languages, from 1973 to the present. In August 2008, it contained 409,000 records. Approximately 14,000 new records are added annually. A detailed description of LLBA may be found at www.csa.com/factsheets/llba-set-c.php.

Use the  button to determine if journal articles are available from a full-text database to which the library subscribes, to see CUNY's print holdings for the journal, and to make an interlibrary-loan request.

Accessing LLBA: LLBA is available anywhere within the Graduate Center by going to the library's Web site at library.gc.cuny.edu and selecting the link to *Databases*. Home access is explained at library.gc.cuny.edu/databases/remote.html.

Searching LLBA: Select *Advanced Search* for more exact searching. *Advanced Search* provides Boolean (*and, or, not*) search boxes and drop-down menus allowing the selection of such sections of a record as *Abstract, Author, Affiliation, Descriptors, Keywords, and Journal Name*. Searches may be limited by *Date Range, Journal Articles Only, English Only*, other languages, and *Publication Type* (book, book chapter, book review, conference paper, dissertation).

The earliest available records to the most recent are searched unless the dates are changed with the *Date Range* menu. The *Quick Search* and *Command Search* (under *Search Tools*) can be used to create Boolean keyword searches such as *second language acquisition and (french or russian) and immigrants*.

Indexes: When uncertain about the name of an author or journal, use *Browse Author* or *Browse Journal Name* or select *Search Tools* and go to *Indexes*.

Thesaurus: Use *Thesaurus Search* (under *Search Tools*) to find the descriptors or subject headings LLBA uses to index articles. The *Thesaurus Search* is available in English, French, and Spanish.

Display Options:

- The default display is *All Publication Types*. Use the tabs at the top of the display to choose from *Journals*, *Peer-Reviewed Journals*, *Conferences*, *Books*, *Web Sites*, and *Scholars*. LLBA includes brief profiles, drawn from COS Scholar Universe, of most authors of articles and books in the database.
- Select *View Record* to a complete record with abstract. The terms under *Classification* may be helpful in refining a search.

Save/E-mail/Print Records: To print records, to save to a disk, your computer, or a bibliographic manager such as RefWorks, or to e-mail them to yourself or others, check in the boxes beside the desired records and click the *Save/Print/Email* button at the top of each set of displayed records.

Saved Searches/Alerts: To save searches you may want to run again or to request alerts for new articles and books, select *Alert Me* and set up a profile.

Additional Resources: Do not limit your electronic linguistics research to LLBA. Linguistics-related citations and/or articles can be found in Academic Search Premier, Arts & Humanities Citation Index, Education Full Text, ERIC, Essay and General Literature Index, Humanities Full Text, Humanities International Complete, MLA, NetLibrary, Project Muse, PsycInfo, ScienceDirect, Scopus, Social Sciences Citation Index, Sociological Abstracts, SpringerLink, and Wiley InterScience. For example, in August 2008, Academic Search Premier included the full text of over 18,400 linguistics articles, and an Arts & Humanities Citation Index search for *linguistic** retrieved over 17,400 items.
