WHAT IS PSYCINFO?: This database includes abstracts for journal articles, book chapters, books, dissertations, and technical reports in psychology and the psychological aspects of other fields. Nearly 2,000 periodicals in thirty-five languages from 1872 to the present are indexed. Chapter and book coverage is of English-language material from 1987 to the present. More than 60,000 records are added each year. There are also links to text in over 500 journals from Academic Search Premier, JSTOR, Project Muse, PsycArticles, ScienceDirect, SpringerLink, and Wiley InterScience.  will help locate the text elsewhere.

ACCESSING PSYCINFO: The database is available throughout the Graduate Center by going to the Mina Rees Library's Web site at library.gc.cuny.edu and clicking *Databases*. Home access is explained at library.gc.cuny.edu/info/remote_gc.asp.


BASIC SEARCH: Use the Basic Search screen when performing both simple searches and keyword searches such as *depression and adolescen* and wom?n*. Such searches look for your term(s) in the article title, author name, and abstract portions of a record. Options for searching within the full text and for related words appear at the bottom of the search screen. You may also limit a search to a specific publication, specific or range of dates, linked full text, references, peer-reviewed journals, publication type (journal, chapter, edited book, authored book, etc.), age group, and population group.


ADVANCED SEARCH: Use the Advanced Search to search for terms and/or names in such specific fields as author, article title, journal name, etc. The same limiters are available as in the Basic Search, as well as language and form/content type.

THESAURUS: Using PsycInfo's controlled vocabulary makes searching more exact. The Thesaurus lists such terms and refers you to the preferred term, as with *aptitude measures* instead of *ability tests*.

INDEXES: The Indexes list all authors, author affiliations, corporate authors, journal titles, publishers, etc. in PsycInfo, along with the number of occurrences of each. The Indexes are especially helpful when you do not have an author's complete name. To get an idea of how helpful Indexes might be, select Publishers and browse for Oxford to see all the variations on Oxford University Press.

CITED REFERENCES: Use this option to track references to authors, titles, and sources. Use All Citation Fields for other topics. Searching this field for City University of New York reveals 590 citations (as of September 2005). Author citations include last name and first/first and second initial: *revenson t a.*

FOLDER: To add items to a folder, click the  [Add](#) icon beside the bibliographic record. When you have finished searching and adding items to the folder, click View Folder to print, e-mail, or save the items to a disk.

SAVING SEARCHES: Whenever you see , a stable URL has been created for your search. Use this URL to rerun your search.
