SCIENCEDIRECT FULL TEXT OF OVER 1,550 SOCIAL SCIENCE AND SCIENCE JOURNALS

WHAT IS SCIENCEDIRECT?: ScienceDirect offers the full text of 1,576 journals from 1980 to the present, with some articles available before they are in print. While this collection is strongest in computer science, mathematics, and the sciences, it provides dozens of titles in economics, education, linguistics, political science, psychology, and sociology. The journals are primarily from Elsevier with others from such publishers as Pergamon. While all ScienceDirect titles may be searched, only those to which either CUNY or SUNY subscribes are available as full text. The green subscribed-journal icon  indicates which are accessible in full text.

ACCESSING SCIENCEDIRECT: To access ScienceDirect, go to the Mina Rees Library's Web site (library.gc.cuny.edu) and click the *Databases* link. ScienceDirect is available at most CUNY campuses. Home access is explained at library.gc.cuny.edu/INFO/remote.asp.

BROWSING: To discover which titles are available in a particular discipline, click the *Journals* button at the top of the *Search* screen. Select *Subscribed Journals* in the *Display* box, *by Subject* in the *Sort* box, and click the *Apply* button. Each broad category opens into more specific groups. An alphabetical list is also available.

SEARCHING: ScienceDirect's basic search will automatically look for your search term(s) with the abstract, title, and keyword sections of a record. If you receive too many results, change the search to one that looks at abstracts only or keywords only by using the drop-down menus on the search screen. If you receive too few results, perform the search as a full-text search that looks for your term(s) within the content of the available articles. Because the database consists of over 1.5 million articles, full-text searches should generally not involve terms that are too broad (business, computers, government, psychology, etc.).

Limit all searches to the broad subject category appropriate to your topic (mathematics, social and behavioral sciences, etc.), and select *Subscribed Journals* in the *Source* box.

Use the advanced-search option to perform a more complicated Boolean search: *women and psycholog* and research and (college* or universit* or academic or higher education)*. As with most databases, the asterisk is the truncation symbol or wildcard.

The default search is for content from 1995 to the present. Change the *Dates* option to *All Years* when you want results before 1995.

DISPLAYING RESULTS: Once you have retrieved search results, you have several options for looking at them. Click *Summary Plus* to see the bibliographic information, abstract, outline, and bibliography. This option may be suitable when you wish to browse through several articles. Click *Full Text + Links* to see the article in HTML format, with a linked outline for longer articles. Click *PDF* to see the full text exactly as it appears in the original journal.

PERSONAL PROFILE: Additional features are available by creating a personal profile. Doing so allows you to run, modify, or delete a saved search; to have a search run automatically at a later date (click *Save as an E-mail Alert*); and maintain a personal journal list and a new-issues-alert list.
