Social Sciences Citation Index (SSCI)

WHAT IS THE SOCIAL SCIENCES CITATION INDEX?: SSCI is a multidisciplinary database covering the journal literature of the social sciences. It indexes over 1,700 journals spanning 50 disciplines, as well as covering relevant items from over 3,300 of the world's leading scientific and technical journals.

SSCI also provides citation information that indicates where and how often an author or article has been cited in the literature. The Graduate Center subscription provides access to SSCI from 1990 to the present.

Use the  button to see if journal articles are available online, to determine if the journal is available in print form, or to request an article through interlibrary loan.

ACCESSING SSCI: SSCI is available anywhere within the Graduate Center by going to the library's Web site (library.gc.cuny.edu) and clicking **Databases**. For home access, see library.gc.cuny.edu/info/remote_gc.asp.

SEARCHING SSCI: Go up to the **Select a search option** area to choose the type of search you want to perform.

1. **General Search** looks for articles on a specific topic, by author(s), or by source title.
2. **Cited Reference Search** looks for articles that cite an author or an article.
3. **Advanced Search** is used to create complex searches that employ Boolean operators (**and, or, not**) to combine search terms and specific fields. Searches can be limited by language and document type. Pull-down menus for setting limits are near the bottom of each search screen. Fields that can be selected include **Terms anywhere, Abstract, Author, Title, Journal Title, Subject, Reviewer, and Subjects**. Searches may also be limited by language or by document type. Two particularly useful document type limits are **Article** and **Book review**.


Only authors' last names and initials are included in the database. To find articles by a specific author, enter the last name followed by one or more initials

in the author box. Use the truncation or wildcard symbol if you are unsure of the initials: o'brian cb or o'brian c* or obrian c*.

Titles of source publications often appear in a highly abbreviated form. To find the abbreviations of journals included in the database, use **the full source titles list** link next to the **source title** box.

E-MAILING/PRINTING/SAVING RECORDS: Individual records or lists of records can be saved, e-mailed, or exported using the Output Records box on the right of the screen. Use the export function to use SSCI in conjunction with EndNote: library.gc.cuny.edu/database/endnote/endnote.asp.

ADDITIONAL CITATION SOURCES: For information about the availability elsewhere, in print or online, of Social Sciences Citation Index, Arts and Humanities Citation Index, and Science Citation Index, see library.gc.cuny.edu/database/mrldatainfo.asp#citation.

Use the  button in such EBSCO databases as Academic Search Premier, CINAHL, PsycBooks, and PsycInfo to find citations from sources within those databases.
